JOHANN ANTON CAPEDER "TONY"

11 March 1935 – Sils/Domleschg, Switzerland

Passed away peacefully on 12 August 2021 in Canberra.

Tony was a member of the Swiss Club since the foundation of the Club in 1967. As an active member he has supported the Club for many years. Some members may remember the "Wiesenfest" at the Schlager's farm. Tony organised the meat and supplies for the spit roasted pig. He and some colleagues stayed over night basting the meat and keeping the fire going. As a dedicated teacher for over 20 years at CIT (School of Hospitality and Tourism), formerly TAFE College in Canberra, his experience was greatly appreciated. For years Tony helped preparing the sausages for the Swiss National Day celebration. When the Club received a grant to acquire a meat slicer to cut the dried meat for the Fondue night, it was Tony's advice that helped the Club decide which machine to buy. Over the years many of us have had the privilege to meet Tony and Eva.

Tony and Eva and just celebrated their 60th Diamond wedding anniversary. Our sympathy and thoughts are with Eva and her family. Due to COVID, a private family service was held at the Gungahlin Cemetery.

Those who knew Tony will feel privileged and will cherish his warm memories. Farewell Tony and rest in peace.























Gebrannte Mandeln / Roasted candied Almonds



The smell of roasted almonds at the markets is so wonderful and they are easy to make at home and can be flavoured with different spices. Makes for a lovely Christmas present.

Ingredients

- ½ I water
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 100 g sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 200 g almonds in their skin

<u>Method</u>

- Add the water, sugar, and cinnamon into a pan and bring to the boil whilst stirring.
- Add the raw, whole almonds and stir continuously over a medium heat until the liquid has evaporated.
- Continue heating and stirring until the sugar melts onto the almonds and they begin to shine.
- Pour the almonds on to baking paper and leave them to cool and dry.
- 5. Bag the nuts in cellophane bags, or put them into tins or jars.

Roasted candied almonds have a shelf life of about 2 weeks.

This recipe can also be made in the microwave, but reduce the water quantity to 2-3 tablespoons and heat at 600W for a minute at a time and stir. Should take about 4 – 5 minutes.

This recipe also works well with other nuts.




Rivella – the Swiss drink

The Swiss drink Rivella is almost 70 years old and is the second most popular soft drink brand in Switzerland. From its small beginnings in Stäfa, it is now produced in Rohtrist in Canton Aargau, as well as in Holland (although the concentrate is shipped to Holland where it is then mixed with water and bottled).

Two people, Roberth Barth and Hans Süsli experimented with whey, a biproduct of the



cheese making, and Swiss herbs to produce a soft drink in 1950, apparently after Barth had received a recipe for a similar drink from a Swiss lady. It was first marketed in 1952, but not without problems as the fermentation would often continue in the bottles resulting in some explosions. Refinements continued and in 1959 at the request of the dutch market, Rivella blue, a diet version was released. This was Europe's first diet soft drink. The name Rivella was inspired by the municipality of Riva San Vitale in Canton Ticino and the Italian word for "revelation", rivelazione.



Whilst it is a popular drink in Switzerland, Lichtenstein and Holland, it has never taken off in neighbouring Germany, despite a marketing campaign.
