This year in a relaxed Covid environment we saw attendance levels rise to 26 children and 45 adults – a really good result. Thanks to the organisers and chefs.














Zucchetti Pickles

Zucchini, commonly known as zuchetti in German speaking parts of Switzerland are a common and easy vegetable to grow. Versatile in their use, they also make wonderful pickles for accompanying raclette or a yummy Brotzeit platter (Ploughman's Lunch). Not difficult to make, but they do take time, like all good things in life.

- 3kg zucchini
- 2 large onions
- 400g sugar
- ½ liter vinegar
- ½ liter water
- 2 tsp mixed peppercorns
- 3 heaped tsp curry powder
- 2 heaped tbsp Salt

Method

- 1. On day 1, cut the zucchini into small bite size pieces and the onions into rings. Mix all together with salt and leave in a bowl overnight.
- 2. On day 2, drain the zucchini and onion mixture and add it to a pot with the vinegar, water, peppercorns, curry and 300g sugar. Bring to the boil and gently simmer for 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and leave to stand overnight.
- 3. On day 3, sprinkle the remaining sugar over the mixture and leave overnight.





Something for the children


Easter in Switzerland is a wonderful time of year, as Spring arrives and houses are adorned with flowers, wreaths, coloured eggs and children's craft work.

Swiss Club Newsletter Vol. 26 No. 1 – March 2023 Trubschachen in Emmental

Switzerland has no shortage of places to visit and marvel, whether it be the mountains, lakes, chocolate factories or cheese dairies. Many are heavily promoted to the overseas tourists and can be very overrun during peak holiday times. Luckily, I live on the edge of the Emmental surrounded by lush farming land and rolling hills, and old farmhouses. With the Emmental cheese factory on my doorstep, another favorite place of mine to take



visitors to is Trubschachen to visit the factory of the iconic Swiss biscuit made by Kambly.

It all started with a love story – the founder, young Oscar met the love of his live in the French part of Switzerland and decided to follow her back to her hometown of Trubschachen where he completed an apprenticeship as a baker/conditor. He then went overseas to complete

more training before returning to Trubschachen to take over the bakery where his apprenticeship had begun.

By 1910 the bakery was too small and Oscar laid the ground stone for what was to become Switzerland's largest biscuit manufacturer in 1910 together with the



help of his brother. Despite the challenges of war in the next few years limiting supplies, his determination to provide quality without compromise prevailed. The iconic Brezeli biscuit for which Kambly is famous for, originates from a recipe handed down to Oscar from his grandmother; a recipe that has been in use since the 1400s.

The fourth generation of the family is now running the company, using a mix of modern robotics and traditional techniques to make high quality biscuits that are exported all over the world. They offer a range of workshops to make pralines and biscuits, and of course a sampling plate is supplied with every coffee in the restaurant. It is definitely worth a visit and the views of the mountains from the surrounding rolling hills afford a good chance to burn off those naughty calories!
