Banking for Swiss Abroad & AHV

Since 2008, it has become increasingly difficult for Swiss Abroad to gain access to Swiss banking services and to maintain these banking relationships on terms comparable to those offered to Swiss residents. Furthermore, banks often terminate client relationships at short notice.



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The Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA) among other organisations fought persistently to change the situation. It is now possible for Swiss nationals to have or open a bank account at reasonable costs.

On 13 December 2023, the Consular Directorate of the FDFA, the OSA and the Soliswiss Cooperative held a webinar on banking issues for Swiss nationals living abroad.

The OSA, Swiss Community, holds and participates in webinars on various topics together with its partners and other specialists.

There were already other webinars on several topics on "Ageing Abroad" such as

- Health insurance for Swiss Abroad (17 October 2023)
- Military Service for Swiss Abroad (20/21 September 2023)
- Estate Planning (13 June 2023)
- Ageing Abroad and OASI (old-age and survivors' insurance AHV, 9 February 2023).

Almond Croissants

Often enjoyed with a good coffee. The other alternative is a walnut croissant.

Ingredients

- 5 tbsp apple juice
- 2 sheets of puff pastry (Swiss size 42x26cm) – adjust number for Australia (4?)
- 250 g ground almonds
- 2 tbsp milk
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- 100g icing sugar

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Heat the oven to 225° C.
- 2. Mix the ground almonds with the apple juice in a bowl.
- 3. Cut 16 even triangles from the puff pastry and add a teaspoon of the almond mixture in the middle of each triangle.
- 4. Brush the edges of the triangles with lemon juice and roll the triangle towards the point. Curve the ends and press each end.
- 5. Place the croissants on baking paper on a baking tray and brush with milk.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven for 25 minutes.
- 7. Mix the icing sugar with some lemon juice and glaze the croissants with the mixture as they come out of the oven.
- 8. Leave to cool on a wire rack.

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Swiss Club Newsletter Vol. 26 No. 3 – October 2023 Snowshoe walking




One of the fabulous things about living in Switzerland is the outdoor life and it is one of the reasons I love living here. Although I must say, I do miss the Australian Wildlife. A new addition to my outdoor kit this year was a pair of snowshoes. Just like the wonderful walking marked everywhere trails that are in Switzerland with the yellow signs, there are many good snow shoe trails marked for those

people who do not have the experience, correct snowshoes or confidence to walk off trail. There is nothing like walking in fresh snow.

For those people that do not want to buy a pair, they can be easily rented from most sport shops for a small fee. It is important to get the right shoes for your weight, otherwise you risk sinking into the snow, which makes it considerably harder, and you become tired much quicker. Also, there are different shoes for different types of terrain, but a good sport shop will help you out. Adjustable walking poles with snow plates are also required. It does take a little while to get used to them, and I recommend walking on the flat first, before trying steep slopes. Do expect to trip over in the beginning - it is all part of the fun.



Tours can be as short or as long as you like. Take some food and a flask or visit the




is nothing like a cool local beer after a hard tour.



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Gruyère



When one hears Gruyère mentioned, most people automatically think of cheese, which it is certainly famous for. However, the town and the area offer many other fabulous things to do aside from the show cheese factory. One of my favourites for its quirkiness is the HR Giger Museum and the bar opposite the museum. Giger is most famous for his contributions to the movie Alien. His work is somewhat macabre and bizarre but nonetheless very interesting and worth looking at. Whilst he was born in Chur, he visited Gruyère for an exhibition and fell in love

with the place so he set about designing his own museum.

Whilst moderately expensive the Giger Museum bar is worth the experience just to view the inside and drink the alien slime whilst sitting in a chair of alien bones.

Aside from the museum, Gruyère is a beautiful medieval walled town that offers stunning views and some other great activities which I will save for another newsletter.
