


Every year Canberra celebrates the National Multicultural Festival where over 170 communities share their cultures through food and entertainment, with stalls and performances around the city centre.

The 2025 festival was held from Friday 7 February to Sunday 9 February. Over 400,000 people attended the 3-day event. Switzerland was represented on Saturday 8 February with a stall from the Swiss Embassy.

The good relationship with the Swiss Embassy was evident when 7 Swiss Club members (Toni, Bernadette, Mirjam, Andrea, Martina, Charles and Gaby) helped the Embassy. 
Our last get-together for the year is scheduled for Tuesday 25 November 2025.




Swiss National Day Celebrations

Kafikräntli at Bruno's Trüffels



Canberra German Week - Family and Community Day



This was a joint venture between the Swiss, German and Austrian communities, celebrating German speaking culture. There were a range of events from 17-25 October, and the Swiss Club participated in the Family and Community Day.

There was German food and entertainment (including live music by Music by Albert), children's activities (including face-painting, a magic show, puppet theatre), and German-language books available at a bargain price. The Swiss stall had free Gruyere cheese to sample and an enthusiastic

group to talk about club activities. The club donated sausages to the BBQ for sale to raise funds for Spielwelt German Parents Association.



Vale Werner Gaugler 23.1.1937 – 15.6.2025



Werner was born in Stuttgart, Germany, the oldest of 4 siblings. The family moved to rural Rosenberg during World War 2 to avoid the bombings. Werner attended school from age 5-13 years, finishing at 1pm and herding cows in the afternoons to help support the family. After the war the family moved back to Stuttgart. Werner completed his schooling leaving at age 14 to do an apprenticeship as a plumber which he finished aged 18. He continued working as a plumber well into his 80s.

He started life in Australia in a migrant centre in Wodonga, then moving to Melbourne and Canberra. In 1967 he returned to Switzerland and Germany and reunited with Susi, a Swiss woman he had met on a train. When he returned to Australia, she followed, and they were married in Brisbane in 1968. They moved to Canberra where they lived for the rest of their lives. Their sons Alan and Christopher were born in 1970 and 1972.

He had a great sense of adventure and loved travel, working in Antarctica for 2 stints of a year or so. He explored the Antarctic landscapes by skiing, motor skiing and dogsleds. He also loved animals, and the family had a variety of pets including a sheep that liked to buck Alan, as well as dogs, rabbits, parrots, and a tortoise among others. He enjoyed life in the outdoors including hiking, skiing, gardening, fishing as well as camping with his family.

Werner was a people person. He loved socialising. After Susi died he joined the Cremeschnitte Chörli and subsequently was a loyal and popular member of the Club's sing together and social group. During his last illness he did not complain, he always had a positive attitude and made the best of things. He was self-sufficient, did not like to bother people but was willing to help others. He had many friends from various stages of his life and is fondly remembered and much missed by those of us in the Swiss Club who were privileged to know him.

Ticino style polenta with Grilled Vegetables and herb butter

Ticino, the Italian-speaking region of Switzerland, is known for its Mediterranean flair — stone villages, chestnut forests, and long, warm evenings where meals stretch into conversation. One dish captures that spirit perfectly: *Polenta alla Ticinese*. Traditionally slow-stirred over an open fire in a copper pot, this golden cornmeal base is as comforting as it is versatile — and when paired with grilled vegetables and a herby Alpine butter, it becomes a perfect vegetarian centrepiece for spring or summer.



Ingredients

- 250 g coarse yellow polenta
- 1 litre water
- 1 tsp salt
- 50 g butter (plus extra for serving)
- 100 g grated Swiss cheese (try Gruyère or a mild Alp cheese)
- 1 zucchini, 1 red pepper, 1 small eggplant, sliced for grilling
- Olive oil, salt, and pepper
- Fresh herbs (parsley, thyme, chives)
- Optional: a few marinated sun-dried tomatoes or roasted cherry tomatoes for colour

Method

1. Bring salted water to a gentle boil. Slowly whisk in the polenta and reduce heat. Stir often for about 30–40 minutes, until thick and creamy. Stir in the butter and cheese just before serving.
2. While the polenta cooks, brush vegetables lightly with olive oil and grill until tender and slightly charred.
3. Finely chop herbs and mix with softened butter and a pinch of salt to make a fragrant Alpine herb butter.
4. Spoon polenta onto plates, top with grilled vegetables, and finish with a generous pat of herb butter.

Serve: With a crisp white wine — perhaps a *Merlot Bianco* from Ticino — and a slice of crusty bread.

This dish bridges the Alps and the Mediterranean, a beautiful reflection of Swiss diversity on a plate. It's hearty yet fresh, easy to adapt for guests, and stunning in colour — perfect for outdoor dining or a light evening meal.

Huttwil Christmas Market – my local favourite

In my nearby town of Huttwil, each year from early November, the small Emmental community transforms into one of Switzerland's most enchanting Christmas villages. Twinkling lights spill across the cobbled streets as more than a hundred wooden chalets fill the air with the scent of roasted almonds, mulled wine, and freshly baked *Zimtsternen*. Artisans from across the country gather to sell handmade crafts, candles, textiles, and local delicacies, joined by the **Landfrauen** — Switzerland's equivalent of the CWA — offering traditional treats and warm smiles.



Beyond the stalls, Huttwil's market offers a heartwarming programme of activities. Visitors can enjoy live choirs, horse-drawn carriage rides, and demonstrations of time-honoured crafts like woodturning and glassblowing. Families especially love the Christmas Village for Children, where little ones can make their own ornaments or feed the friendly farm animals — all against the backdrop of the snow-dusted


Emmental hills.

Whether you come for shopping, food, or simply the cosy glow of holiday spirit, Huttwil's market captures the true magic of a Swiss Christmas. It's a delightful day trip from Bern or Lucerne, best enjoyed with a steaming cup of *Glühwein* and a woolly hat. Be sure to visit during the week if you can — it's become so popular that busloads now arrive from Zurich and Lucerne. Still, it remains one of my favourites, rivalled only by the atmospheric castle markets such as Wasserschloss Wyher and Schloss Thunstetten.

Swiss Lakes Crossword




Across

10. At over 2,200 m, this Grisons lake is the highest in the Alps accessible by rail.

1. Glacier-fed lake above Kandersteg in canton Bern, famed for its emerald colour (Swiss german name)
3. Lake close to the French border and in the Jura range at 1000 m above sea level.
